



# PREMIER LEAGUE 2019/20 SUMMER TRANSFER GUIDE



## ARSENAL

After a slow start to the transfer window and rumours of a meagre budget to spend, it's fair to say Arsenal fans will have been fearing the worst. However, it's forced the Gunners to be smart with their money and exploit alternative payment plans in order to secure their top targets, with the club remaining capable of attracting some big names to the capital. There's still some long-standing weaknesses in the squad but defensive reinforcements were eventually secured and the attacking additions will ensure the football is as entertaining as ever.



Teenager William Saliba was signed before immediately returning to Saint-Etienne on loan. However, Dani Ceballos should prove a real coup regardless of a whopping £15m loan fee, filling the void left by Aaron Ramsey and capable of playing anywhere in the midfield. Then came club record signing Nicolas Pepe, with the Gunners beating a number of top club's to the signing of the Lille star - scorer of 22 league goals last season, along with 11 assists to his name. His arrival should lead to a change in formation given his threat from the right, while two crucial signings were made on deadline day. David Luiz and Kieran Tierney will bolster the backline and both are upgrades on those already at the club, while the club secured a great fee for Alex Iwobi.

There is no question that Arsenal have added great quality in the form of Ceballos and Pepe but their delay in securing defensive additions could lead to teething problems early on. The formation may be more balanced this season than last but their options at centre-back still look weak, while a lack of cover at right-back, will likely see them scrapping for fourth at best once again.

### **ASTON VILLA**

HEAD COACH DEAN SMITH

With 13 players leaving upon the club's promotion back to the big time it was always likely to be a busy summer at Villa Park. However, few could have predicted just how prolific Aston Villa would be in the market. Many have compared their summer spending to the likes of Fulham last year but three players have returned following loans and adding competition for places was a must. While only time will tell if Smith can get his new look squad to get, getting deals done early will give the coach the best possible chance of doing exactly that.





Kortney Hause, Anwar El Ghazi and Tryone Mings are all back at the club, with the latter costing a pretty penny but worth every one to the fans having been a huge part of the club's promotion. Record signing Westley is an unknown entity in England but had been on the radar of a number of Premier League clubs for some time and will be tasked with replacing top scorer Tammy Abraham. Elsewhere Tom Heaton provides much needed experience in goal for a good price, Matt Targett will take Neil Taylor's place at left-back, while Ezri Konsa and Bjorn Engels provide competition at centre-back. Meanwhile Douglas Luiz and Marvelous Nakamba have arrived to strengthen the midfield and Jota and Trezequet will vie for places out wide. And breathe...





NET SPEND

It's difficult to assess the transfer window at Villa for a number of reasons, with so many new faces to integrate and many of those not having played in England. That said, their strength in depth should stand the club in good stead over the course of the campaign and their decision to sign young players eager to prove their worth and willing to learn will provide a strong platform if they can beat the drop.

### BOURNEMOUTH

Bournemouth's transfer policy has been steadfast for some time now. with the south coast club looking to young, homegrown talent to continue their impressive development in the top-flight. This summer has been no different and while it's been a relatively quiet one compared to some, the Cherries have strengthened their squad and addressed areas of weakness in the process. Meanwhile they've sold some fringe players for high fees and kept hold of their prized assets in what has been a very financially astute window for the club.



The first through the door at the Vitality Stadium, Lloyd Kelly was snared from Bristol City before the window had even opened and arrives with a strong reputation. An England U21 international capable of playing at left or centre-back, he serves as a replacement of sorts for Tyrone Mings. Bournemouth got a great deal for the latter, whose sale has enabled them to add competition in areas that needed it. Jack Stacey is a versatile full-back who played a key part in Luton's promotion, while Philip Billing adds quality and height to a midfield lacking both. Meanwhile signing both Harry Wilson and Arnaut Danjuma, both of whom are full internationals able to play on either flank, gives Howe great depth in attack but will require a juggling act to keep everyone happy.

It's been a busy summer on the south coast and the Cherries have gone about their business very effectively. ### BRIGHTON

Unquestionably the most significant change at the Amex comes in the dugout, where new coach Graham Potter will be aiming to implement a very different style of football. The former Swansea boss favours a possession-based approach to the game so a lack of recruitment in the midfield area in particular is a concern for the Seagulls, who will need to adapt quickly. There have been some significant new arrivals but perhaps not in the right areas to suggest that Brighton have really made great strides this summer.





The signing of Leandro Trossard understandably excited the fans early in the window, with the Belgian having attracted interest from the likes of Arsenal in the past. He's a goalscorer that operates best from the left flank and should take some of the pressure off of the ageing Glenn Murray. However, it's the acquisition of Neal Maupay from Brentford - having had a direct hand in 33 league goals last season - that could see the veteran striker phased out. Elsewhere record signing Adam Webster will slot into a new back three system this season. The defender arrives from Bristol City for a fee in the region of £20m and was the highest rated centre-back in the Championship last season (7.30). Meanwhile Aaron Mooy's deadline day arrival adds much needed depth in midfield.





NET SPEND

The arrivals of Trossard and Maupay have given Brighton an attack that they can finally get excited about as continuing to rely on Murray would have been a big gamble. Nevertheless the strongest XI still looks among the weakest in the league heading into the season and a lack of creativity in midfield is concerning. There's added quality at the back though, so the Seagulls should be competitive.

# BURNLEY



While the Clarets are rarely overly busy in the transfer market the lack of activity this summer will be a concern to some of the fans, with the club clearly hoping that continued stability is enough to stave off the threat of relegation. There have been a couple of new additions that fall into the category of being very 'Burnley' but there will be no change in approach from Sean Dyche next season. If it ain't broke don't fix it certainly comes to mind, but the club do run the risk of being dragged into a relegation battle.



The most notable signing is the return of former academy graduate and fan favourite Jay Rodriguez, who arrives from West Brom seven years after leaving Turf Moor. The 30-year-old proved he still has an eye for goal in the Championship last season, netting an impressive 22 times. Keeping hold of Dwight McNeil was equally important, while the experienced Erik Pieters should provide the teenager with the confidence to make his mark in attack down the left flank. Elsewhere the departure of captain Tom Heaton is a blow but with a year left on his deal, the Clarets secured a decent fee and a promising replacement in Bailey Peacock-Farrell. Deadline day addition Danny Drinkwater could prove a coup if he can get back up to speed having endured a torrid time at Chelsea.

# CHELSEA

With a transfer ban enforced upon the club it's fair to say returning club legend Frank Lampard hasn't arrived at the best of times given his managerial inexperience. A baptism of fire would be an understatement, even if the fans are sure to give their former midfielder the patience he will no doubt need from the terraces to try to compete with the very best. However, while there may not be any 'new' signings to speak of there will still be some (very) fresh faces integrated into the first team fold this season.





The signing of Christian Pullsic in January means there is at least one new name at Stamford Bridge following the American's return from Loan at Borussia Dortmund, and the youngster should play a prominent role. That, of course, is in no small part down to the departure of talisman and undisputed star player Eden Hazard, whose loss will be keenly felt for some time. Mateo Kovacic was permitted to sign on a permanent deal due to an agreement in his previous loan transfer from Real Madrid. Olivier Giroud should lead the line initially, though Tammy Abraham will be desperate - along with the returning Mason Mount - to prove worthy of a starting spot. The decision to allow David Luiz to join rivals Arsenal raised evebrows on deadline day and could leave Chelsea short if injuries strike.

Hamstrung by the transfer ban imposed against them, Chelsea could do little more than they have this summer. That said, while inevitable, the sale of Hazard is a monumental blow that cannot be overstated. It's an opportunity for the likes of Pulisic and - once back fit - Callum Hudson-Odoi to stake

# **CRYSTAL PALACE**

While the club keeping hold of Wilfried Zaha was always likely to be more important than any new signing. Palace's summer spending will have underwhelmed the fans to say the least. Hodgson will now need to try to get the best from a player that made it clear that he wanted

to leave the club. The loss of Aaron Wan-Bissaka, albeit at a good price, will be a huge blow and failing to replace the youngster could prove costly, while a lack of activity in recruiting another striker could also prove to be a huge oversight.



Jordan Avew returns to Selhurst Park following a loan spell from Swansea but failed to find his feet in front of goal last season. Elsewhere Gary Cahill is reunited with his former England boss - a man who gave the former Chelsea skipper the armband at international level - and should start in a move that could see James Tomkins moved to right-back given the failure to recruit a new one. The midfield has been bolstered by the arrival of Victor Camarasa. who arrives on an initial loan with a view to a £15m move following a successful loan spell at Cardiff last season. Finally, James McCarthy has signed from Everton but is one of a number of players at the club that have not played a lot of football in recent times and will surely take time to get up to speed.



# **EVERTON**

First through the door was goalkeeper Jonas Lossl on a free, who is a very capable deputy to Pickford, before Andre Gomes' loan deal was made permanent. The Portugal international will be joined in the midfield by England international Fabian Delph at a cut price, while Jean-Philippe Gbamin may replace Gueye but could also feature at the back. However, the most intriguing and unexpected signing is undoubtedly that of Moise Kean, whose form at the tailend of last season was hugely impressive. For that reason it comes as a significant shock that Juventus have allowed the teenager to leave. Elsewhere Djibril Sidibe will provide stiff competition at right-back with Seamus Coleman, while Alex Iwobi's big money arrival at the last means Everton have a hugely exciting young attack.





NET SPEND

While Everton have lost a key player in Gueye they've used the money from his transfer and two substitutes to more than replenish the squad. That's smart business but there is a lot of pressure on Kean to score the goals required to turn Everton into a team capable of qualifying for Europe. They do look much stronger this time around though, so all in all it's been a very successful summer.

# LEICESTER

The transfer saga that hung over the club all summer was finally concluded as Harry Maguire completed his move to Manchester United but despite the England international's departure there is reason for real optimism at the King Power Stadium. The £80m received for the centre-back - a world record fee for a defender - has essentially ensured that Leicester have been able to sign four players in his place, although the fact that none of said quartet are a direct replacement for Maguire will ring some alarm bells.



The top priority this summer was a familiar face to Leicester fans and the permanent acquisition of Youri Tielemans - who had attracted the interest of Manchester United - is a statement of intent for where this club is headed. The young Belgian didn't come cheap but does arrive with very little risk attached given how he impressed on loan. Meanwhile Avoze Perez's arrival from Newcastle should offer another dimension to Rodgers' exciting side, and voungster James Justin is a versatile and attack-minded full-back who should win over the fans. Don't be surprised to see the latter's arrival push Ricardo Pereira into a more advanced role at times, while the deadline day addition of Dennis Praet from Sampdoria offers the team great strength in depth in the middle of the park.

# LIVERPOOL

To say it's been a quiet summer at Liverpool would be a huge understatement and while the fans are understandably still on cloud nine following their Champions League success in May, the Reds are certainly at risk of losing ground at the top of the table. The likes of Adam Lallana and Alex Oxlade-Chamberlain returning from injury will bolster their options somewhat but serious injury to any number of key players will leave Jurgen Klopp's side exposed when compared to





The Reds signed 17-year-old centre-back Sepp van den Berg from PEC Zwolle but the Dutch teenager is only likely to feature in early domestic cup rounds, while the same can be said of Harvey Elliott. The 16-year-old is regarded as one of the brightest young prospects in English football but remains just that - a 16-year-old prospect - so he will see very little action too. Two goalkeepers have arrived on free transfers in the form of Adrian and Andy Lonergan but the fact remains that Liverpool haven't improved their squad where every one of their rivals has managed to do so. Should Mo Salah or Sadio Mane face a spell on the sidelines, or either full-back for that matter, Liverpool could not only be left behind but caught up by the chasing pack.






There will be some Liverpool fans that may point to Tottenham's ability to reach the Champions League final as justification for sticking with what you've got but Spurs were left desperately exposed in the league when injuries struck. Klopp's starting lineup is still the closest in terms of quality to that of Manchester City but their depth in some areas is concerning so they'll need a little luck on their side.

### **MANCHESTER CITY**





Unquestionably the most important new arrival. Rodri's acquisition from Atletico Madrid eases the burden on 34-year-old Fernandinho to protect the back four. City's hopes of retaining their crown were temporarily dashed when the Brazilian picked up an injury last season but the new Spanish recruit will be the main man for the years to come. Elsewhere there is now much healthier competition in the full-back positions following the signings of Joao Cancelo and Angelino, both of whom are very attack-minded and will hope to be more than just understudies this season. Keeping hold of Leroy Sane despite strong interest from Bayern Munich was the right decision too, but failing to find a replacement for Vincent Kompany was a disappointment.

**MANCHESTER UTD** 

While Manchester United managed to secure their two top transfer targets this summer they were forced to spend huge fees in order to do so and given the lack of quality and depth in other areas there is a sense that their money could have gone further. There is little question that they have addressed two major problem positions in the squad and will be stronger for it, but bizarrely their team now looks stronger in defence than attack and they will need the likes of Rashford and Martial to step up their game following Lukaku's departure.





It took patience and deep pockets but United have revitalised a problematic backline with the acquisitions of Aaron Wan-Bissaka and Harry Maquire. The former arrived for a fee in the region of £45m which seemed like a lot initially but has begun to look more shrewd following impressive pre-season performances and the money spent on a number of signings since. One of said signings is Maguire, who is undoubtedly a significant upgrade for the club but had to become the most expensive defender in history in order to make the move. Elsewhere Daniel James should prove an astute signing to offer competition out wide with his electric pace but failing to replace either Ander Herrera and Romelu Lukaku, nor recruiting a right-sided winger could cost the Red Devils dearly.







Ole Gunnar Solskjaer arguably prepares for his first full season as United boss with a stronger squad than he inherited but given the talk of a potential overhaul at Old Trafford, the club spent a huge amount of time on signing two players in particular. It was as if they were only willing to work on one deal at a time and as such they've been left short in numerous departments.

### NEWCASTLE

Rafa Benitez's decision not to extend his contract ahead of the current season meant that Newcastle had to appoint a new manager before making any real moves in the transfer market and the frustration continued to mount at St. James' Park as a result. Steve Bruce's arrival in the hot seat hardly lightened the mood but the club have at least looked to replace key players that left earlier in the summer. Salomon Rondon and Ayoze Perez scored 23 of the team's 42 goals last season, leaving centre-back Fabian Schar as the Magpies' top scorer, with four.



There's plenty of pressure on record signing Joelinton to carry the can in front of goal and while the Brazilian - like predecessor Rondon - is a very hard working and physical forward, he too is far from prolific. The 22-year-old netted just seven times in the Bundesliga last season, assisting five, but has been among the goals in pre-season and should improve. The same is true of Allan Saint-Maximin, whose arrival from Nice could prove a real coup but also has the potential to end in disaster. The young Frenchman was something of a disruptive character in Lique 1 and while there is magic in his boots in terms of his dribbling at times, his end product needs real work. Elsewhere, Jetro Willems and Emil Krafth provide decent competition in the wing-back roles. Oh, and Andy Carroll is back...

## NORWICH

There is a fine line between faith and naivety and it's one that Norwich have tread like a tightrope this summer. The Canaries were never likely to compete financially with the competition in the top-flight but their lack of spending is alarming. The fans will argue that tying the likes of Max Aarons and Emi Buendia down to long-term deals is better than any new signing but should Norwich fail to beat the drop their crop of impressive youngsters aren't likely to stick around. Should any key players pick up injuries they may struggle.





There are a handful of new faces at Carrow Road but whether any of those recruits improve upon last season's strongest XI is debateable. It should be said that Daniel Farke was able to rotate his squad in midfield last season to little to no detriment, with every player knowing their role, but this is a big step up. Ralf Fahrmann is arguably the one clear upgrade on Tim Krul in goal, while Patrick Roberts should prove an astute loan signing from Manchester City, Elsewhere Ibrahim Amadou could become an important player in breaking up play in midfield. while Josip Drmic has found the net in patches in the Bundesliga but struggled with injuries. He will act as an understudy to Teemu Pukki, while Sam Byram does little more than make up the numbers in defence.





While Norwich were the best team in the Championship last season and shouldn't be discredited as a result, there's no question it's been a disappointing summer in terms of new arrivals. Keeping the faith with the players that secured promotion is admirable and the stability that brings may be a bonus to start the season but as it draws on the squad could become exposed.



### SHEFFIELD UTD

With a modest transfer record to break. Sheffield United were always likely to do just that this summer and they have done so on multiple occasions. Chris Wilder has a very clear and unique way of approaching the game and that won't change so keeping the core of the team in place was logical, whilst adding some more useful options in attack. The back four - including the goalkeeper - may remain unchanged but with no notable departures there will be ample opportunity to rotate what is now a far more competitive squad.



While former Blade Phil Jagielka made an emotional return to Brammall Lane the centre-back, who turns 37 this month, will have been signed due to his influence off the pitch arguably more than on it. Callum Robinson, Lys Mousset and Oliver McBurnie all broke the clubs transfer record upon their arrivals but will likely vie for two places in the XI, with the latter likely to lead the line, while Ravel Morrison is a complete wildcard signing.

Many felt the Austrian may make more changes to his squad as a result but after getting some notable deals done early there hasn't been a great deal to discuss in terms of incomings or outgoings. That said, the coach did appear to have a good idea of his strongest XI by the end of last season and a full summer under his tutelage could prove very beneficial to a number of players that developed significantly following his arrival.





An agreement in Danny Ings' loan deal from Liverpool ensured he made the move permanent for a lofty fee and concerns over the striker's fitness and form were confirmed when Southampton moved fast to sign Che Adams. The former Birmingham marksman should prove to be a very astute signing following what was a breakthrough season in front of goal, adding a finishing touch to his considerable physical attributes. The decision to allow Matt Targett to leave without a replacement may prove premature, albeit at a good price, and strength in depth at the back is an issue in general. Elsewhere young winger Moussa Djenepo will be interesting to watch, with fans hoping he's more Sadio Mane than Mohamed Elyounoussi, while the last gasp signing of defender Kevin Danso was crucial.

Meanwhile Ryan Sessegnon arrives from Fulham to compete for places on the left, while Jack Clarke - who returned to Leeds on loan - was another investment for the future.

### WOLVES

Wolves' transfer strategy clearly has a long-term vision and with the added reponisibility of Europa League football to contend with Nuno is likely to rotate his squad having strengthened at either end of the pitch. 
